Webinar on future of English studies held



Prof Moon Moon Mazumdar has spoken on English Studies: Prospects & Challenges in a New Scenario in her audio lecture. In the present scenario a lot of changes have taken place and with these changes one has to change his/her mind in adjusting with current situation and in adopting new and creative ideas to meet the challenges. With much stress on the study of native languages in these days, there have been definitely been apprehensions in the minds of the people about the future of English Studies and it is also true that it will be too early to comment on the issue in detail at the present juncture when NEP has just been released and implementation part is yet to take place, but Prof. Mazumdar has touched upon the prospects and challenges that may lie in the implementation of the policy of giving priority to learning mother tongue or native language. But she looks at the issue positively and is hopeful about the future of English Studies in India. We, the students of English literature and language have at least got some definite direction to move forward and pursue our studies with renewed enthusiasm, keeping in mind the transformation and reform that is taking place specifically in higher learning with each passing day.

Moving onto the next what G. Baskaran Sir has spoken on *New Education Policy and North East Writings & Translation*. Well, after the recent implementation of NEP, India will go through a massive transformation in education starting from pre-primary to higher education & during the pandemic, the traditional mode of teaching and learning has already been transformed into digitalized & computerized mode of the same. Sir has dealt with all the diverse aspects of the topic under consideration in his lecture with special reference to NEP and Higher Learning Programmes, taking into consideration four year programme with multiple exits. Sir has also discussed substantially the future of English Studies in India, whether it is going to be replaced or retained. Apart from those Sir has taken many significant North East texts for analysis. On the top of this, Sir has also focused on translation of texts from regional languages and how it is going to connect the

lesser known community to the mainstream etc. TSir has made extensive and elaborate discussion on the given topic.

Next moving on to what Dr. Vinod kr Singh Sir has pondered upon in his lecture entitled *On Beholding a Distant Relative: The Relevance of Teaching English Literature Today*. In his talk, he has begun with a quick critical account of our engagement with English Literature hitherto and then has proceeded further towards the promises it might offer in future. He has also focused on specific articulations about English Literature in our Education Policies in a very distinct manner. Sir has negotiated with the given topic very well indeed!
